Good Friday and Easter 2024



Dear people of the Good Shepherd ~

The journey of Lent began on Ash Wednesday and ends on Easter Day. This time for spiritual refreshment actually comes to a proper end not just with Easter Day, but also with that best of days, Good Friday. You simply cannot have Easter without Good Friday. If there is no death, then there is no resurrection.

The salvation of the world burst out onto that world on the day of Christ's rising from the dead. But the victory of that salvation was won, with blood, sweat and tears, on the cross. The resurrection makes that saving work of God available to all who put their trust in Christ. It pours that love into all who would receive it. The real symbol of the resurrection is not the so-called 'empty' cross, but rather the *very* empty tomb. The 'full' cross of Good Friday, full of the broken body of Christ, expresses the astonishing healing, forgiving love of God. This cross is inseparable from the empty tomb.

The two images above attempt to display this truth, this reality. An artist friend of mine once tried to draw them. He told me that they were some of the hardest things to draw. They are not just another figure on a cross, nor another vacated hewn piece of rock.



They are the very depths of God's heart revealed to the world. Their message - too deep, too immense, too complete and holy - are impossible to convey with a mere drawing or two. Yet, to the degree that we can perceive it, they convey the very yearning of God towards this world.

Let us know the incredible 'goodness' of Good Friday and the awesome freedom of Easter Day, now, and throughout the whole of 2024, and especially in these days of world-wide uncertainty militarily, environmentally, and socially. May we know and share this incomparable hope in God's love and light for the sake of the whole world.

The glory of Good Friday and the joy of Easter Day bless you richly, now, and always,

PAC Report

The PAC (Parish Advisory Council) is responsible for finding a new incumbent (priest and rector) for our parish. It is comprised of Wardens Terry Ricketts and Susan Jack as well as Barry McQueen, Jeff Maker and Beverly Janes.

The process to date has included:

- o Assessing our priorities by asking for input from everyone.
- o Meeting with Arch Deacon Leo Martin.
- o Updating our Parish Profile which is used by prospective candidates to get a feel for who we are and who we are looking for.
- Meeting with Archbishop David Edwards who has told us that there has not been a lot of clergy movement over the last year, but he is expecting more in the next little while.
- Talking with Father Keith about his willingness to stay with us over the next 12 months to continue to grow our faith and numbers. Father Keith and Elinor have graciously agreed to do so.

Next Steps:

- Forecast our income and expenses for the next several years to assure ourselves that we can afford a full-time priest and rector. Conversely, can we afford **not** to have a full-time incumbent? Our future as a parish depends on it.
- Wait (patiently) for the right person to come forward who can inspire and lead us into our future.

What can you do?

- o Pray for the work of the PAC. Pray they are able to discern the person that our parish needs to lead us in our ministries on the West Side of Saint John.
- Pray for Father Keith and Elinor and their ministries here in the Parish of Lancaster.

The joys of worship - reading scripture in worship by Fr Keith

At the heart of our worship is not the worshippers but the One being worshipped, namely God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. We gather for worship to *give ourselves* to God in praise and adoration. We are also to *give* Him open hearts and minds willing to receive from God His grace in Word and Sacrament.



Significantly, the reading and listening to the scriptures is vitally important. The role, not only of Layreader, but also of the congregational reader, who usually reads the Second Reading every Sunday, is significant, and actually a privilege. This is because they are not merely reading words from an ordinary book but are reading the very written word of God. Their 'job' is not simply to come up and read quickly the reading of the day, but rather to read thoughtfully what God has to say to His people through that written word.

Yet, it is not a solo endeavour. The people hearing the reading are to listen and receive that word of God attentively and caringly. Both reader and listener are intentional and active in the public reading of God's word contained in the scriptures. The reader is not just sounding out the words on a page but is declaring a message from God. The listener is not merely hearing words being read but is to be listening with heart and mind to this message from God.



On the practical side, in order to help the scripture passage stand out when it comes time for a reading to be offered, I've asked readers to pause briefly after announcing the reading and before starting to read. Likewise, when the reading is finished, readers are to have a definite pause before saying: "Hear God's word for God's people", or "The Gospel of Christ". And I have very much appreciated the fine efforts made by our readers to put this into practice. With that, I want to say thank you very much to all who do take a turn in reading in our times of worship. That's not only on Sunday, but also at other occasions of worship, since as Anglicans, we are not a 'Sunday only' worshipping congregation.

Lift continues to meet on the second Thursday of the month at our new time of 2pm in the small hall. We have been blessed with a couple of new members.

In January LIFT voted to send donations to Saint Rose School, Barnhill Memorial School, and Coverdale Centre for Women. The ladies also created some wonderful Valentines Cards which were sent to some of our congregants and were also available to the congregation for distribution.

PLINK, PLONK, PLINK

Nicki Gumbel, the founder of Alpha tells this story.

Lord Radstock was staying in a hotel in Norway in the mid-nineteenth century. He heard a little child playing the piano downstairs in the hallway. She was making a terrible noise: "Plink... plonk... plink..." It was driving him mad! A man came and sat beside her and began playing alongside her, filling in the gaps. The result was the most beautiful music. He later discovered that the man playing alongside was the girl's father, Alexander Borodin, composer of the opera, PRINCE IGOR. God calls you into a relationship that involves cooperation with Him. The Christian faith is about what God has done for you in Christ. However, we are not mere spectators. We are called to respond.

Here's a question for you: when it's time to worship God in song during our Sunday morning worship, do you hit the mute button? Are you afraid that God or the people around you will be offended by your singing? Come on, admit it; I know many of you have said as much to me. If you answered yes to either of the above here are three more questions for you:

- 1. Does God actually judge our singing on the quality of our vocal production, or does He listen for something else?
- 2. Does God excuse any of us from singing His praises? Do some of us have 'non-participation cards?'
- 3. Does it really matter what the people around you think? And where is THEIR focus if they are judging you?

*NB. Answers to these questions by those who provide music leadership will of necessity be more nuanced.



Quick answer:

God wants us ALL to be contributors, not just consumers during our worship services. He wants to take your "Plink ... plonk ...plink ... " and make something beautiful out of it. Our part is to be all in - heart first and then voice.

In my next column we will explore what Holy Scripture and great hymn writers have to say about our singing.

WORSHIP




Holy week will soon be upon us and several services marking the journey to Easter morning are planned.

SUNDAY SCHOOL


We are so happy to have Laura Janes step in as our fulltime Sunday School teacher. We are thankful that she is willing to become the young leader for this group.

Our largest west facing roof had a new metal roof was installed in late February before the torrential rains of March hit us.






HOUSEKEEPING

Clean up work continues around the church. Nooks, crannies, and closets are being cleaned out to track what we have, purge what we don't need and assign specific areas for items to be stored.

Shelves were added to the end closet in the Narthex to store extra prayer books, hymnals, and bibles.







Signs for the A.E.D. have been placed around the facility to direct people to the A.E.D. machine located in the main hallway. You will see these in the front entrance area, upper mezzanine door, gym, and back hall.



The upper room above the small hall (old Sunday School Classroom) had become a catch-all room in recent years. It has been cleaned out and organized. The closet shown holds unused gowns for both choir and clergy while the space above it stores historical documents. A large walkin closet to the right of the piano will now store seasonal Altar Guild items.





Water Usage in Our Church

Please Check....

Make sure the water is not running!

A running toilet or tap can cost us \$100 in no time.



If you can't get it to <u>stop</u> please turn off the valve and contact the Office.

We are on a water meter which means that we are billed for water we consume. If a tap or a toilet is left running, we pay the price.

Be vigilant! When walking by our bathrooms listen to see if money is pouring down the drain.

If a toilet is running typically a jiggle to the handle will fix the problem. If not turn off the valve and let someone know.



FINANCE UPDATE

Financial results for the end of February are currently showing a small loss of \$6,058, which is slightly higher than our budgeted loss of \$3,348. For the same time period of 2023, we were showing a surplus of \$1,201, however we had yet to receive our first Natural Gas invoice for Jan and Feb. Adjusting for that, our expenses are tracking near budget and near last years' actuals. Our issue is Offerings are tracking about 12 – 13% below budget and last year.

It's too early in the year to forecast with much accuracy, so the right-hand columns below show the 2024 approved budget against the 2023 actuals. If the trend for offerings continues, we could be facing a loss of up to \$21,000 for 2024. Lots of time to turn that around though.
