## Easter Message

What is Easter all about? The Easter Message is about the depth of God's love and passion for us human beings. Now some may be tempted to just sum up the message of Easter with the word "Love" and they wouldn't be wrong. It is in fact the greatest, clearest, most moving and impactful message of love. While we may be able to sum up the message of Easter as love it is paramount to recognize that the message is about a Person and that Person is Jesus Christ. God became flesh and dwelt among us in Jesus. God came to show us the way to be truly human in that Jesus shows us what a human being fulfilling His vocation is all about. God reveals what His Kingdom is like in the words, teachings, and actions of Jesus. It is important to grasp that at the heart of the Easter message is the Person of Christ. He was fully God and fully man. He lived a sinless life and demonstrated God's love at every turn. He healed the sick, cleansed the lepers, opened the eyes of the blind, fed the hungry, and call all people to repent, to turn from evil and learn to do what is right in the eyes of God. Jesus didn't simply speak words of love, He demonstrated love in every action. Sometimes those actions were gentle and compassionate and sometimes He spoke hard words to people with calloused hearts but in every situation and every moment Jesus showed love to God the Father through His perfect submission to his will.

While it is tempting to boil it all down to love I tend to resist that simplification of the Gospel because the Gospel is about a Person. If we say to someone outside of the church that the Easter Message is simply about love, we are depriving them of the knowledge that the Easter Message is about the love of God and the love and passion of Jesus. Jesus walked the heavy road to Jerusalem knowing all the

while that He was going to be betrayed at the hands of sinners. He knew that He was going to be put to death and not just any death but the agony of the crucifixion. He knew that He would be mocked and scorned and that people who heckle and jeer at him. He was beaten and rejected. This Passion of Christ demonstrates God's love in a way that no other way could. In order for Jesus to offer salvation to sinful human beings He must stand and suffer in their place, in our place. I pray this Easter that you will focus on the Person of Christ and His Passion which is the deepest expression of His love for you and me.

**Isaiah 49:16**, says, See, I have inscribed you on the palms of my hands. We know God's love for us for Jesus still bears the marks of the crucifixion when He willingly laid down His life for us!

### **GOOD FRIDAY VIGIL - NOON UNTIL MIDNIGHT**

We will continue our tradition of holding a vigil after the Good Friday service. We are looking for pairs of volunteers to sign up for one-hour segments between noon and midnight - a sign-up sheet is in the narthex or you can call the office. ## BIBLE STUDY

Our Bible Study Group has been meeting on Tuesday evenings in the Small Hall and on Zoom since February. We are participating in NT Wright's Simply Jesus Small Group Course. Each week we hear Tom present his own interpretation of a bible passage from one of the gospels and then he speaks on that passage for about 20 minutes. He is a solid teacher and a good presenter. There are usually 4 of us in the Small Hall and another 6 or 7 online through the Zoom Application. I enjoy our lively discussions!

## Our Finances

After experiencing significant annual losses for 2020 and 2021, we knew this year was going to present challenges financially. As you may recall we went into this year budgeting for a loss of \$30,100. What we didn't expect was unprecedented high furnace oil prices and over \$2,000 in furnace repair bills in the first quarter of 2022.

Our income for the first 3 months of 2022 is only slightly below budget and only slightly behind the same period for 2021. Expenses, on the other hand are \$6,400 over budget and \$7,100 over the first 3 months of last year.

We pray that as pandemic restrictions are lifting that our income improves and as we exit the heating season that we can manage costs for the remainder of the year so that our current loss does not increase beyond the \$30,100 budgeted loss. Any loss we experience is covered by our Memorial Fund which currently sits at \$143K.

### A CHRISTMAS BASKET TESTIMONIAL

On March 27<sup>th</sup>, one of our wardens, Sharon Baxter, arranged for her good friend, Mary Lou Price, to address the congregation. It was a thank you and a testament to the power of God when he works through us in our mission projects. Her moving story is presented in her words below:

*This is the story about my nephew BP and his constant companion - Bud the cat.*

*BP is a quiet, solitary and brilliant man who struggles with mental illness. His mental illness was recognized in his late teens after a suicide attempt. Despite early struggles, with medication and the proper support he has always held a fulltime job that provided him with the basics. He took great pride in the fact that he could pay for a roof over his head, food, minimal savings, bus fare and just enough left over for the occasional Tim's coffee and his favorite sour cream donut. Sometimes a cat toy for Bud.*

*As far as BP was concerned, life was good. A great source of pride for him was that he did not have to depend on his parents, me or anyone else for anything. That was until Covid hit and the lockdowns happened. Like many folks, it hit him hard. Due to lack of work, he was laid off from his job. The job that not only provided a source of income, daily structure and a sense of purpose, but it afforded him some of the socialization he needed so he did not feel isolated and alone.*

*Then it seemed like a cascade of bad luck descended on him. He and all the tenants in his affordable apartment building were evicted so the new owners could renovate. It was a struggle*

to find him accommodations in his price range that would accept Bud, so he had to go a little higher than his budget. Both of his parents became ill and that was a tremendous source of worry for him. BP had to start using the food bank and Romero House to make ends meet. This was also stressful for him as he felt he was taking away from those who truly needed help.

Eventually BP's phone was disconnected and I was not able to reach him for quite a few days. When I went to his apartment, I was shocked at the man who answered the door. He had lost about 30 pounds, was disheveled and looked like he had given up. He begged me not to tell his parents that he had been existing for the last week on stale cheerios and water. He had used the last of his money for a couple of cans of food for Bud as he couldn't bear for Bud to go hungry. After buying him some groceries and calling his parents on the "down low", we came up with a partial solution. He would accept his parents paying for his medications and phone as he needed it to apply for work, but he would not budge on anything else. So that brings me to Sharon and Lori. I mentioned to my good friend Sharon about his plight and the next thing I knew she and her sister were on the case. BP was set up to receive a Christmas basket from the Church of the Good Shepherd and on their own, Sharon and Lori made sure that Bud was gifted with food and toys.

When I picked up the Christmas basket, I was floored at how much was donated. BP would not have to worry about food security for at least a month!! BP was overwhelmed at his Christmas basket and it brought him to tears. He could not believe strangers would do this for him. He was so grateful and it was in that moment I sensed something shifted. He was so uplifted by the generosity that he felt hope again. What is more, on that hope he gathered the strength to go and look for work. While on the lookout for a job, BP applied and was accepted into a work program, set up with a counsellor, training and a job placement. He is now working fulltime and may be eligible for new housing that is just a hop, skip and jump from his new job.

From the bottom of my heart, I want to thank you and the Christmas basket team sincerely for being Good Shepherds and being Jesus centered in the community. A box of food and supplies, given in the spirit and light of Christmas uplifted my nephew from the darkness. It brought the true meaning of Christmas to his heart and most importantly - gave him hope and joy that he is still carrying with him today.

## FINANCIAL FUTURE COMMITTEE (FCC)

The FCC continues to gather further information on the costs and benefits associated with three options that could be pursued to provide additional income to help offset the considerable costs associated with heating and maintaining our building. The options under consideration include:

- An **Adult Day Care** to provide programs for older adults with cognitive impairment. This could be run from the Small Hall. We are working with a contact in the Department of Social Development to determine the income opportunity as well as the accessibility requirements.
- Production of home-made meals (**Home Meal Replacement**) using the Large Kitchen and selling them from the Small Chapel. We would like to also be able to provide an opportunity for skill development for people in need of a leg-up and are looking for a partner for this.
- Conversion of the Large Hall (gym) into **Affordable Housing**. We are working with Housing Alternatives and have had an architect look at the space. We are waiting on that report to understand the income potential.

We would welcome any input regarding the options that are under consideration as well as any ideas you might have for additional opportunities. Our committee is currently meeting monthly for about an hour if you are interested in joining us.
