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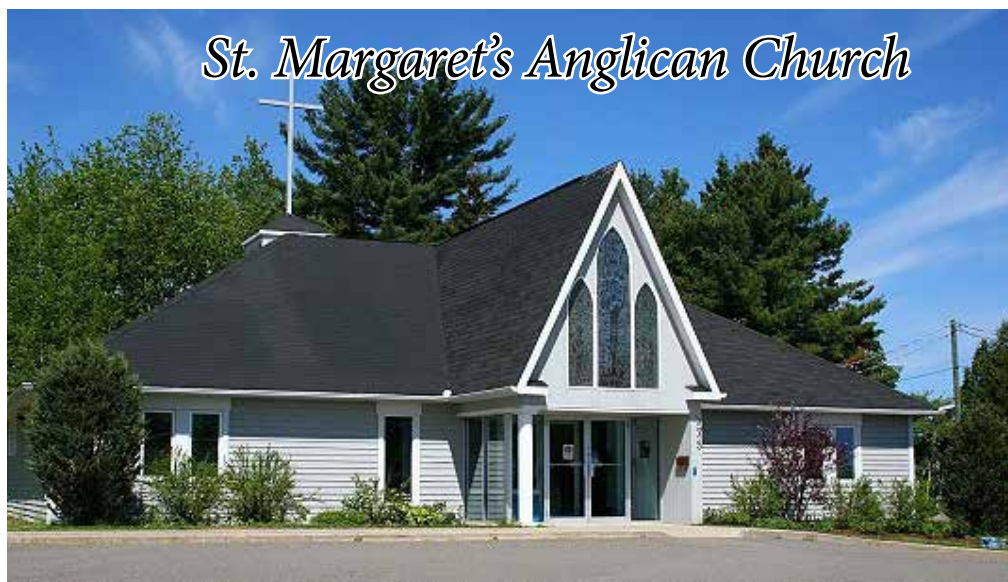

Diocesan Treasurer's Report - Spring 2025

With each report, I start with the weather of the day. This past week the temperatures have risen and it has been raining. We have lost most, if not all, the snow in our yards in the capital region. Time is certainly going by quickly as we finish the first quarter of 2025.

We held up pretty well in 2024. There were 31 branches that sent their dues, but of those 31, one branch has closed: St. John in Oromocto at the end of 2024.

I would like to thank all those branches that sent in their dues last year. What I am planning on doing this year is contact each of the Deanery Presidents to get an actual list of those churches in their Deanery that have an operating branch.

I have been warned by the bank that it will not accept any cheques that are not filled out properly. Please make the cheque out to "ACW Diocese of Fredericton." I will have to return any cheque to the sender to have it filled out properly.

Also included with this report is the Branch Treasurer's Report Form on page 4. Every branch

is responsible to send \$50 for the Administration Fund and \$25 for the Social Action Fund. These two funds are your first priority before you divide your money among other organizations.

We have suggested that your branch can send more than the \$50 and \$25 to these Funds, but that is up to your branch.

You will notice a new item on the list. The Executive has passed a motion to include the Carpet Fund for Farraline Place. The Home needs new carpeting in all the hallways, sitting rooms and stairways on all three floors of the Home.

They have been quoted a total of

\$10,000 for all three floors. This will bring not only comfort for the residents, but it will improve the look of the Home.

I have also included the year-end financial report for 2024. Our total income was **\$32,025.93** and our total expenses were **\$29,431.45**. The total in our books as of December 31, 2024 was \$46,110.38. The bank balance as of December 31, 2024 was \$50,432.18.

As a reminder, if your Branch decides to close, a formal letter from the branch president needs to be sent to the Executive with a cheque for the remaining balance of the branch account stating where the money is to go.

I look forward to seeing you all at the AGM in May at our church, St. Margaret's, Fredericton!

In the midst of chaos

“The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.” (Galatians 5:22)

I’ve been thinking a lot about Jeremiah ever since preparing a sermon a couple of months ago on Jeremiah 17.

In the midst of the chaos south of the border and the looming tariff threats, these verses spoke to my heart:

“Blessed are those who trust in the Lord... They shall be like a tree planted by water; sending out its roots by the stream.

“It shall not fear when heat comes, and its leaves shall stay green; in the year of drought it is not anxious, and it does not cease to bear fruit.” (Jeremiah 17:7-8)

Those words came to me like the answer to a prayer. We’ve all been asking, “What are we to do when the world around us seems to be crumbling? When we can’t count on anything to be the same from one day to the next?”

Jeremiah, of all people, knew what it was like to live in uncertain times. He was never secure. He never knew whether he was going to be thrown in jail, tossed into a cistern to starve to death, or executed for disagreeing with the false prophets who promised prosperity.

He knew there were people plotting to kill him (18:23). He had one close call after another. If anyone had a reason to be anxious and depressed, he did!

His life was one long struggle to survive and still obey God. Yet, he could say, “Blessed are those who trust the Lord.”

In spite of it all, he could still proclaim words of hope. Can I have that same trust that he had? Can I bear fruit in a drought?

Perhaps the problem is that I’ve always had an expectation of an uneventful life. I’ve taken things for granted.

My particular generation really has had it pretty easy. The Baby Boomers were born into post-war prosperity, with medicare introduced in the early 1960s.

My life has been secure. I’m not prepared for the upheaval I’m witnessing south of the border — now with a federal election thrown into the mix.

So — what am I supposed to

do in all of this? I think the message from Jeremiah may be the answer: do not cease to bear fruit. And what should that fruit look like?

Well, I can get a pretty good idea from the teachings of Jesus, particularly the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-7); and the Apostle Paul actually offers a convenient list: “The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.” (Galatians 5:22)

As I look at the political situation south of border and here in Canada, with the frenzy and furor of a national election, and provincial premiers haggling over tariffs, it can be quite a challenge to behave lovingly, joyfully, peacefully, patiently, kindly, generously, faithfully, gently and self-controlled.

It isn’t easy when I’m surrounded by negativity and sectarianism. Everyone is choosing sides, and it’s hard not to go down that road too. Facebook offers plenty of opportunities to do so!

Poor Jeremiah went against his instinct for self-preservation and continued to follow God’s instructions, even when he was bewildered by them. He stuck it out in Jerusalem during a horrific siege in which desperate women sacrificed their own children.

He accompanied refugees down to Egypt knowing that God had specifically told them not to go there. He didn’t turn tail and run, even when he knew disaster was inevitable. Can I have that kind of faith?

ACW Presidents' Conference 2024 report

I was pleased to represent our Diocese at the ACW Presidents' conference this year. The Diocese of Huron hosted the conference in Stratford, Ont., on Sept. 26-29. The theme was "Let Your Light Shine."

On Thursday we enjoyed a beautiful meal followed by Holy Eucharist at St. James Church. We were then welcomed by MPP for Perth-Wellington, Matthew Rae, and the Mayor of Stratford, Martin Ritsma.

Greetings were also extended by Karen Haslam, Huron ACW president and Rosemarie Kingston, president of the national ACW board.

On Friday we had an all-day business meeting, which included constitutional and financial matters and a workshop.

We heard from different speakers from Anglican Foundation of Canada, PWRDF (Alongside Hope), Mothers' Union, Council of the North and International Anglican Women's Network (IAWN).

They all gave updates on their organizations. Michelle Hauser, AFC's director of development and communications, said AFC has donated over \$40 million.

This year's Say Yes To Kids campaign yielded \$130,000 for 33 teams. National Indigenous youth received \$40,000.

The ACW Council of the North Retired Clergy Fund received support from many diocesan ACWs.

Janice Biehn talked about PWRDF's Indigenous Response Grant Fund, which is available

for Indigenous-led communities and organizations. These are one-year grants of between \$5,000-15,000 for community health, climate action, safe water and emergency response. PWRDF has set aside funds for emergency response in Canada for wildfires and hurricanes.

We also allowed time for fun. One evening, a hilarious "fun fashion show," hosted by the Huron ladies, had everyone in stitches. Another evening, we learned dance steps with Scottish country dancers.

Saturday's free time saw delegates shopping, boating on the River Avon, perusing Art in the Park, taking a tour of the Stratford Festival's archives and warehouse and seeing the Stratford Festival production of *Romeo and Juliet*.

Archbishop Linda Nicholls presided at the Sunday worship service at St. James Church. She installed the national ACW executive to their positions.

Archbishop Linda spoke of angels in the Bible, from Genesis to Revelation. Angels are God's creation. Angels are invisible but occasionally are seen as dreams, sometimes in human form, in the liminal space where they are heard as the angels in the field appearing to the shepherds. Scriptures only refer to them as men. It may be that the writers were men.

There are women serving God. Angels are an example of service. Anglican women are preparing, setting the table and serving: as priests, as wardens, on altar guilds, in choirs, as bishops and as supporters of food banks.

These women mirror the work of angels in their life and vocation of serving God, not only in the parish, but in the community.

Archbishop Linda encouraged us to reflect on our work in the world, to worship with joy and to seek to be the bearer of good news. She encouraged us to live with compassion, listen and help those in need.

The theme "Let your light shine" was reinforced throughout the conference. There were theme poems at meal place settings. We are to continue in our spiritual growth and nurture life.

We are encouraged to do both the walk and the talk, to spread the light of our baptismal covenant. God shines through us, and we shine our light on God.
