Processional Hymn "Let There Be Light" CP 572 ADVENT BEGINS

In Advent we get ready for Jesus to come back to earth. We also get ready to celebrate Christmas, that Jesus was born in Bethlehem many years ago.

The circle of the Advent wreath tells us that there is no beginning or end to God. The evergreen speaks of continuous new life in Jesus Christ. The candlelight tells us that Jesus is the light of God in the world.

The violet/purple colour of the candles helps us to think very seriously about ourselves before a loving and holy God. Advent prepares us to meet God in Jesus Christ: we prepare for His second coming, we prepare to celebrate the Incarnation which is Christ's first coming – God with us, in human form, and we prepare for His coming to us in our daily living.

And so, we now bless the Advent wreath and its candles for its use this year.

BLESSING OF THE ADVENT WREATH

The Lord be with you. **And with thy spirit.**

Let us pray.

O LORD Jesus Christ, who art the true light that lightest everyone that cometh into the world: bless, we pray thee, this wreath and its candles which we shall light in preparation for thy coming; and so enkindle our hearts with the fire of thy love that we may receive thee with joy and gladness, and evermore stand fast in the faith. Who livest and reignest, world without end. **Amen.**

LIGHTING OF THE FIRST ADVENT CANDLE

The first of the four outer candles on the Advent Wreath is lit. The presider then continues with the following prayer.

Let us pray.

Heavenly Father, death swallowed up in victory brings the light of your Son to illumine our minds and enliven our hearts with hope. Make us watchful and keep us faithful as we await the coming of your Son our Lord; that we may be ready to meet you in him, active in his service and joyful in his praise; the Alpha and the Omega, Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**



The Alpha and the Omega

This is the Advent symbol of Jesus from Revelation 1:8 ('I am the Alpha and the Omega', says the Lord God, who is and who was and who is to come, the Almighty.) and 22:13 (I am the



Alpha and the Omega, the first and the last, the beginning and the end.) These are the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet, Alpha and Omega. Not only does this symbolize the One who came and who will come again, it also emphasizes the continuity of God's work in history throughout both the Old and the New Testaments.

Jesus as the "Alpha and Omega" is that he was at the beginning of all things and will be at the close. It is equivalent to saying he always existed and always will exist. It was Christ, as second Person of the Trinity, who brought about the creation: "Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made" (John 1:3), and his Second Coming will be the beginning of the end of creation as we know it (2 Peter 3:10). As God incarnate, he has no beginning, nor will he have any end with respect to time, being from everlasting to everlasting.

About Advent

What Does Advent Mean?

but there's more to Advent.

In liturgical Christianity, Advent refers to the period of four weeks leading up to Christmas. It begins on the Sunday closest to November 30 (St. Andrew's Day) and ends on December 24. It is a time of anticipation and preparation for the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ on Christmas Day. Some people may know that the Advent season focuses on expectation and think it serves as an anticipation of Christ's birth in the season leading up to Christmas. This is part of the story,

The word "Advent" is derived from the Latin word *adventus*, which means "coming" or "arrival," which translates to the Greek word *parousia*. Scholars believe that during the 4th and 5th centuries in Spain and Gaul, Advent was a season of preparation for the baptism of new Christians at the January feast of Epiphany, the celebration of God's incarnation represented by the visit of the Magi to the young boy Jesus (Matthew 2:1), his baptism in the Jordan River by John the Baptist (John 1:29), and his first miracle at Cana (John 2:1). During this season of preparation, Christians would spend 40 days in penance, prayer, and fasting to prepare for this celebration; originally, there was little connection between Advent and Christmas.

By the 6th century, however, Roman Christians had tied Advent to the coming of Christ. But the "coming" they had in mind was not Christ's first coming in the feeding-box in Bethlehem, but his second coming in the clouds as the judge of

the world. The Advent season was not explicitly linked to Christ's first coming at Christmas until the Middle Ages.

What Does Advent Symbolize?

Advent symbolizes the church's present situation in these "last days" (Acts 2:17 - "In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams." Hebrews 1:2 – "but in these last days he has spoken to us by a Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, through whom he also created the worlds".) as God's people wait for the return of Christ in glory to consummate his eternal kingdom.

The church is in a similar situation to Israel at the end of the Old Testament: in exile, waiting and hoping in prayerful expectation for the coming of the Messiah. Israel looked back to God's past gracious actions on their behalf in leading them out of Egypt in the Exodus, and on this basis, they called for God once again to act for them. In the same way, the church, during Advent, looks back upon Christ's coming in celebration while at the same time looking forward in eager anticipation to the coming of Christ's kingdom when he returns for his people.
