### **OUR PURPOSE**



### More on Elizabeth Scovil and the Pickett-Scovil Fund


After reading the Elizabeth Scovil story that appeared in the September issue of *Launching Out*, you might have had the impression that Elizabeth provided the bulk of the original income for the fund, which is used to assist retired clergy and spouses with medical care not covered by Medicare.

In fact, it was set up such that people endowed one day of the calendar year (in memory or honour of someone) with a \$50 donation. Synod journals for years included the list of up to 365 endowments.

Some other interesting bits researched by Cheryl Jacobs:

- Lucy Pickett, the other partner in the fund, was appointed / commissioned diocesan David Wetmore Pickett Missionary Nurse by Bishop John Richardson Oct. 2, 1909. You might say she was the original parish nurse.

- A fund named the David Wetmore Pickett Memorial Fund was also set up to help fund nursing care beyond Lucy's ability to do the work (her rather sudden death in 1910 not being expected).
- Elizabeth Scovil took up the mantle of the languishing fund in 1914 (per report to the Synod in 1915) and established and, it appears, vigorously promoted the day-endowment idea.
- Elizabeth did also contribute to the fund at least once (\$15) prior to becoming the secretary in 1914.
- By 1914, the fund was just called the Pickett Memorial Fund.
- Elizabeth's 1916 synod report indicated 46 days (of 365) were endowed already.

### APPLE CRUMBLE

Slice and peel a lot of apples, enough to almost fill your baking dish. OK, leave about an inch for the topping. Add 3/4 cup of sugar and a teaspoon or two of nutmeg.

Then mix together 1 cup of oatmeal or 1 cup of flour or half a cup of each, plus ¼ cup of brown sugar. Rub in 1/3 cup butter.

Mix the above ingredients well then spread over apples. You may have to double this if you have a large baking dish.

Bake at 350 degrees until apples are mushy, approximately 45 minutes to an hour.

I am including the next bit of information that I had in the last Launching Out:

Again, through our Extra-Cent-a-Day fund, we are offering a \$2,500 grant to any rectory in need. Talk to your Vestry and have them put in a request to the Synod Office.

The Synod's finance team will make their decisions according to the ACW standards of disbursements.

bank statement in January.

## On the production team

"The threshing floors shall be full of grain, the vats shall overflow with wine and oil." (Joel 2:24)

hen I imagine what it would be like to be safe and secure in a home of my own, the words that come to mind are "being under my own vine and fig tree."

I love the phrase, "vine and fig tree." It's God's promise to his people, that they will dwell in safety and have just what they need, and it's first mentioned in reference to the reign of Solomon: "Judah and Israel lived in safety . . . all of them under their vines and fig trees." (1 Kings 4:25).

Recently, I noticed something in our weekly Bible study that I hadn't really thought about before.

Throughout the Scriptures, blessing is described in such a way as to require some investment of labour on the part of the ones being blessed.

A land flowing with milk and honey isn't like "Big Rock Candy Mountain." It's a land where there is prosperity when work is done to achieve it.

There will be abundant harvests — after the ground has been tilled, and seeds have been planted. The soil is fertile, God will provide the right amount of sun and rain, but nothing will be accomplished without the co-operation of the receiver.

How is abundance and blessing presented in Scripture? Sun, rain, fertile soil, and hard work.

The writer of Ecclesiastes says, "There is nothing better for mortals than to eat and drink, and find enjoyment in their toil." (2:24) "This is the gift of God." (5:19)

The writer of Proverbs sings the praises of the satisfaction that comes from enjoying the fruits of one's

The Torah makes allowance for providing for the poor, by instructing farmers to leave the gleanings of the harvest in the field so that those in need can collect it for themselves.

As I thought about it, some current examples came to mind: community gardens like the one supported by St. Mary's York; the Greener Village Food Bank in Fredericton, which offers bread baking courses; the Neighbourly Coffee Shop at 12

Neighbours, which teaches job skills, and offers homemade food, made completely from scratch.

I know it's satisfying to create good food that others enjoy.

I believe we should have a universal livable income that encourages self-improvement and doesn't penalize those trying to better themselves.

When God blesses people, he gives them an opportunity to be on the production team instead of just being the audience.

In fact, many business consultants will tell you that employees are happier and more engaged when they are included in decision-making, and are treated as valued and respected members of a working group.

We have a loving heavenly father who has given us free will, and many opportunities to live fruitful and satisfying lives, when we participate.

All this has gotten me thinking about a few things. I understand why it's important for First Nations to have control of their own affairs. from child welfare to economics.

I have met people who would rather live in a shack in the woods, made with their own hands, than accept space in a homeless shelter.

I'm still on my journey, and learning every day, under my own vine and fig tree.




